

USDA Designates 10 Vermont Counties as Primary Natural Disaster Areas News Release | Vermont | September 18, 2019

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WASHINGTON, Sept. 18, 2019 – Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue designated 10 Vermont counties as primary natural disaster areas. Producers in Addison, Bennington, Caledonia, Chittenden, Essex, Franklin, Orange, Rutland, Windham, and Windsor counties who suffered losses due to excessive rain and prolonged, cool temperatures that have occurred since April 1, 2019, may be eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) emergency loans.

This natural disaster designation allows FSA to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain debts.

Producers in the contiguous Vermont counties of Grand Isle, Lamoille, Orleans, and Washington, along with Berkshire and Franklin counties in Massachusetts; Cheshire, Coos, Grafton, and Sullivan counties in New Hampshire; and Clinton, Essex, Rensselaer, and Washington counties in New York, are also eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for these emergency loans is May 6, 2020.

FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

FSA has a variety of additional programs to help farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster. FSA programs that do not require a disaster declaration include: <u>Emergency Assistance for Livestock</u>, <u>Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program; Emergency Conservation Program; Livestock Forage</u> <u>Disaster Program; Livestock Indemnity Program; Operating and Farm Ownership Loans</u>; and the <u>Tree</u> Assistance Program.
