

USDA Designates Eight Counties in Utah As Primary Natural Disaster Areas

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WASHINGTON, May 1, 2018 – The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has designated eight counties in **Utah** as [primary natural disaster areas](#) due to losses and damages caused by a recent drought. Those counties are:

Carbon	Garfield	Millard	Utah
Emery	Juab	Sanpete	Wasatch

Farmers and ranchers in the following contiguous counties in **Utah** also qualify for natural disaster assistance. Those counties are:

Beaver	Kane	San Juan	Tooele

Farmers and ranchers in the contiguous counties of Lincoln and White Pine in **Nevada** also qualify for natural disaster assistance.

Qualified farm operators in the designated areas eligible for the Farm Service Agency’s (FSA’s) [emergency \(EM\) loans](#), provided eligibility requirements are met. Farmers in eligible counties have eight months from the date of the declaration of April 26, 2018, to apply for loans to help cover part of their actual losses. FSA will consider each loan application on its own merits, taking into account the

extent of losses, security available and repayment ability. FSA has a variety of programs, in addition to the EM loan program, to help eligible farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster.

Other FSA programs that can provide assistance, but do not require a disaster declaration, include: [Operating and Farm Ownership Loans](#); the [Emergency Conservation Program](#); [Livestock Forage Disaster Program](#); [Livestock Indemnity Program](#); [Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program](#); and the [Tree Assistance Program](#).
