USDA Designates Five North Carolina Counties as Primary Natural Disaster Areas

Emergency Support to Producers in Surrounding Counties Also Available

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16, 2021 — The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) designated five North Carolina counties as primary natural disaster areas. Producers in Dare, Onslow, Tyrrell, Washington and Wilkes counties who suffered losses caused by excessive rains that occurred from April 1, 2020, through November 14, 2020, may be eligible for USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) [emergency loans](#).

These natural disaster designations allow FSA to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain debts.

Producers in the contiguous North Carolina counties of Alexander, Alleghany, Ashe, Beaufort, Bertie, Caldwell, Carteret, Chowan, Currituck, Duplin, Hyde, Iredell, Jones, Martin, Pender, Surry, Watauga and Yadkin are also eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for emergency loans under this designation is Oct.12, 2021.

FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability

FSA has a variety of additional programs to help farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster.
