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Emergency Support to Producers in Surrounding Counties of Atlantic, Camden, and Cumberland

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23, 2020 — Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue designated two New Jersey counties as primary natural disaster areas. Producers in Gloucester and Salem counties who suffered losses caused by drought that occurred from Aug. 15 through Oct. 16, 2019, may be eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) <u>emergency loans</u>.

This natural disaster designation allows FSA to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers recovering from natural disasters. Emergency loans can be used to meet various recovery needs including the replacement of essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganization of a farming operation or the refinance of certain debts.

Producers in the contiguous New Jersey counties of Atlantic, Camden, and Cumberland, along with Kent and New Castle counties in Delaware, and Delaware and Philadelphia counties in Pennsylvania, are also eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for these emergency loans is Sept. 10, 2020.

FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

FSA has a variety of additional programs to help farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster. FSA programs that do not require a disaster declaration include: <u>Emergency Assistance for Livestock</u>, <u>Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program</u>; <u>Emergency Conservation Program</u>; <u>Livestock Forage</u> <u>Disaster Program</u>; <u>Livestock Indemnity Program</u>; <u>Operating and Farm Ownership Loans</u>; and the <u>Tree</u> Assistance Program. Farmers may contact their local USDA service center for further information on eligibility requirements and application procedures for these and other programs.
