USDA Announces Availability of Low-Interest Physical Loss Loans for Producers Affected by Natural Disasters for 2 Oklahoma Counties

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Physical loss loans through the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) can help producers repair or replace damaged or destroyed physical property essential to the success of the agricultural operation, including livestock losses. Examples of property commonly affected include essential farm buildings, fixtures to real estate, equipment, livestock, perennial crops, fruit and nut bearing trees, and harvested or stored crops and hay.

Impacted Area: Texas

Triggering Disaster: losses caused by wildfires occurring on July 14, 2023

Application Deadline: April 22, 2024

Primary Counties Eligible: Llano

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

Texas: Blanco, Burnet, Gillespie, Mason, San Saba

Triggering Disaster 2: losses caused by wildfires occurring on August 5, 2023

Application Deadline: April 22, 2024

Primary Counties Eligible: Archer, Jack, Wichita, Young

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

Texas: Baylor, Clay, Montague, Palo Pinto, Parker, Stephens, Throckmorton, Wilbarger, Wise

Oklahoma: Cotton, Tillman

Triggering Disaster 3: losses caused by wildfires occurring on July 26, 2023

Application Deadline: April 22, 2024

Primary Counties Eligible: Hill

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

Texas: Bosque, Ellis, Johnson, Limestone, McLennan, Navarro

Triggering Disaster 4: losses caused by wildfires occurring on August 10 through August 14, 2023

Application Deadline: April 22, 2024

Primary Counties Eligible: Knox

Contiguous Counties Also Eligible:

Texas: Baylor, Foard, Haskell, King, Stonewall, Throckmorton
